

Arrests 2022: Law Enforcement Response to Crime in the San Diego Region

February 2024

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Introduction

On an annual basis, the SANDAG Criminal Justice Research Division prepares a report on local criminal justice agencies' response to crime in the region as measured by arrest statistics. Because arrest statistics include information regarding whether the suspect is an adult or juvenile and a greater variety of crime types than are reported in regional crime reports (e.g., alcohol/drug-related offenses), this information provides an added dimension for understanding the nature of crime and another measure that can be used in justice system planning. Some points to remember when interpreting these numbers include the following:

- The data presented here were provided by the Automated Regional Justice Information System (ARJIS).¹ This CJ Bulletin includes regional arrest rates per 1,000 residents for both adult and juvenile populations, as well as number of arrests by offense type.
- The offense or charge attributed to an arrest reflects only the most serious out of multiple potential violations included in the arrest.
- Arrests are documented by the location the arrest occurred and cannot be assumed to have any relationship to the location of the crime incident or the residence of the alleged offender.
- Arrest and crime rates and numbers should not be compared to one another. The two events may occur in two entirely different periods of time, with an arrest made months or even years after the related crime was reported.
- For youth, even though contact with law enforcement is made and an arrest report is taken, diversion to a community-based organization or other type of program or release to a parent or guardian may occur as an alternative to juvenile justice system processing.
- Numbers presented in this report may vary from the ones reported in previous years because updated population estimates were used.²

Highlights

- Arrest rates for adults continued to decrease to a seven-year low.
- Juvenile arrests increased for all crime categories in 2022, ranging from 17% to 64%.
- There was an average of 148 adult arrests per day in the San Diego region in 2022, down from 155 in 2021.
- In 2022, the misdemeanor arrest rate was 5% lower than in 2021, falling to a new seven-year low.
- Similar to 2021, about two in every five arrests were felony level offenses in 2022.
- Arrests decreased for all racial/ethnic groups, though Black and Hispanic individuals continued to be overrepresented in arrest statistics.

¹ For all reports prior to 2021, data were provided by the California Department of Justice (DOJ). After 2020, the DOJ failed to fulfill the annual request for this data, and SANDAG started using ARJIS data instead. 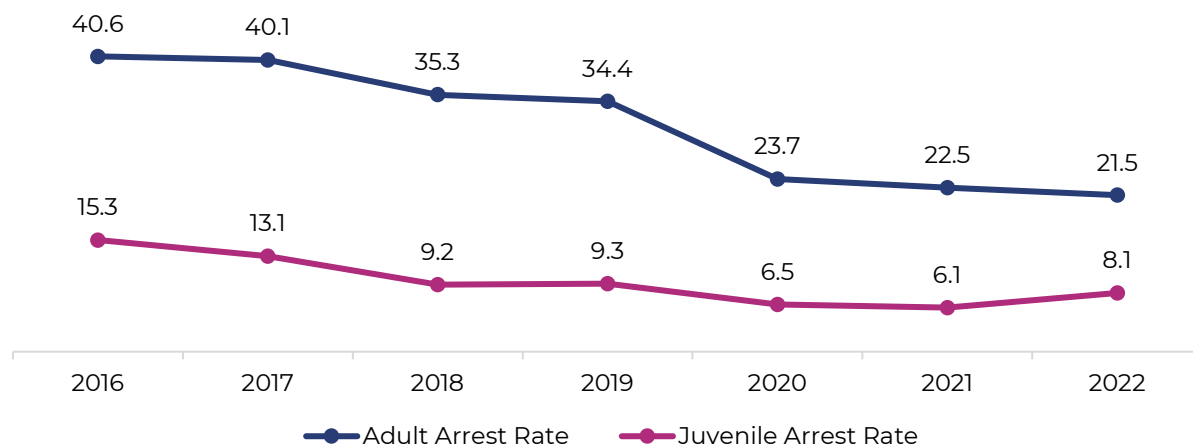
Arrest rates³

Trends

In 2022, there were 21.5 adults arrested per 1,000 population, a decrease of 5% from 22.5 in 2021. As Figure 1 shows, this 2022 rate was the lowest in the past seven years. Across the jurisdictions, the 2022 adult arrest rate varied from 12.0 in Carlsbad to 36.0 in Lemon Grove. Compared to 2021, in 2022 seven jurisdictions had lower adult arrest rates (ranging from -3% in Santee to -17% in Lemon Grove), and 12 had higher rates (ranging from <1% in Escondido to 40% in Coronado) (Appendix Table 5).

For juveniles, the 2022 rate of 8.1 represented an increase of 33% from 2021, the first since 2019. Across the jurisdictions, the juvenile arrest rate varied from 2.0 (Solana Beach) to 18.1 (National City) in 2022. Of the 11 jurisdictions with large enough juvenile arrest numbers for 2021 and 2022 comparison, nine had increases, ranging from 8% (Unincorporated) to 105% (Chula Vista) (Appendix Table 8).

Arrest rates at seven-year low in 2022 for adults, but increased for juveniles



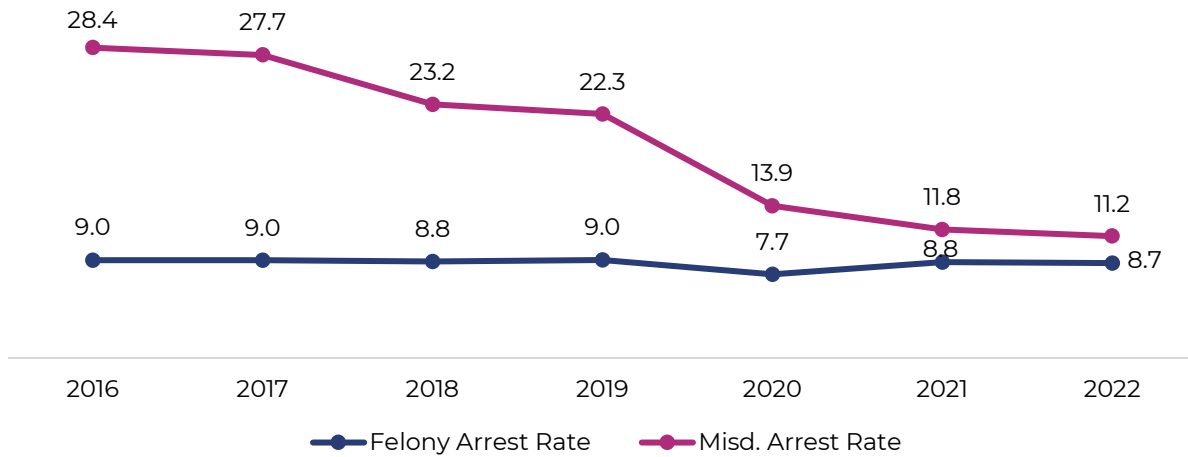

Felonies and misdemeanors

Since the passage of Prop 47 in 2014—which reduced several property and drug-related offenses from felonies to misdemeanors—the felony arrest rate has remained fairly constant, while the misdemeanor rate dropped to a seven-year low in 2022 (Figure 2, Appendix Table 3, and Appendix Table 4).

³ For this analysis, only arrests for individuals aged 10 and older are considered. Individuals less than 10 years old are excluded as they represent less than 1% of total arrests per year. Rates are calculated per 1,000 residents.

Misdemeanor arrests at a seven-year low



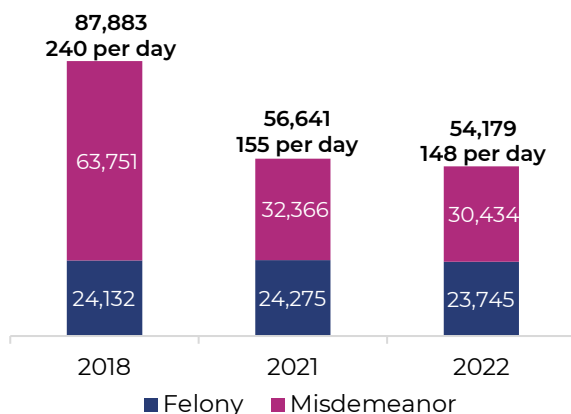

Arrest numbers

As Figure 3A and Appendix Table 12 show, there were fewer adult arrests in 2022 (54,179) compared to 2021 (56,641) and 2018 (87,833). While there were fewer arrests, a greater proportion were for felonies (44%) in 2022, compared to 2018 (27%).

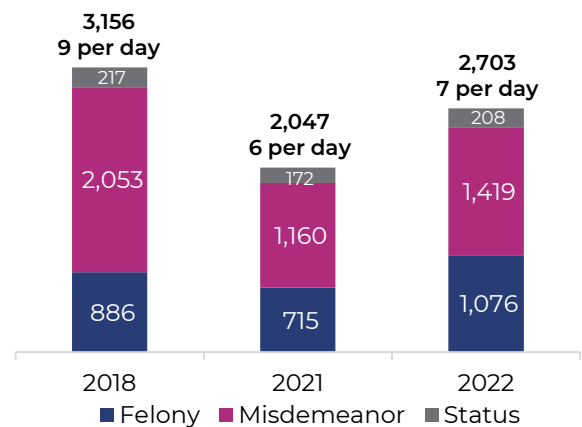
The number of juvenile arrests significantly increased in 2022 (Figure 3B and Appendix Table 25), with a greater percentage at the felony level (40% in 2022 compared to 28% in 2018), and lower misdemeanor rates (52% in 2022 compared to 65% in 2018). The proportion of status arrests remained fairly constant from previous years (8% in 2022 compared to 7% in 2018).⁴

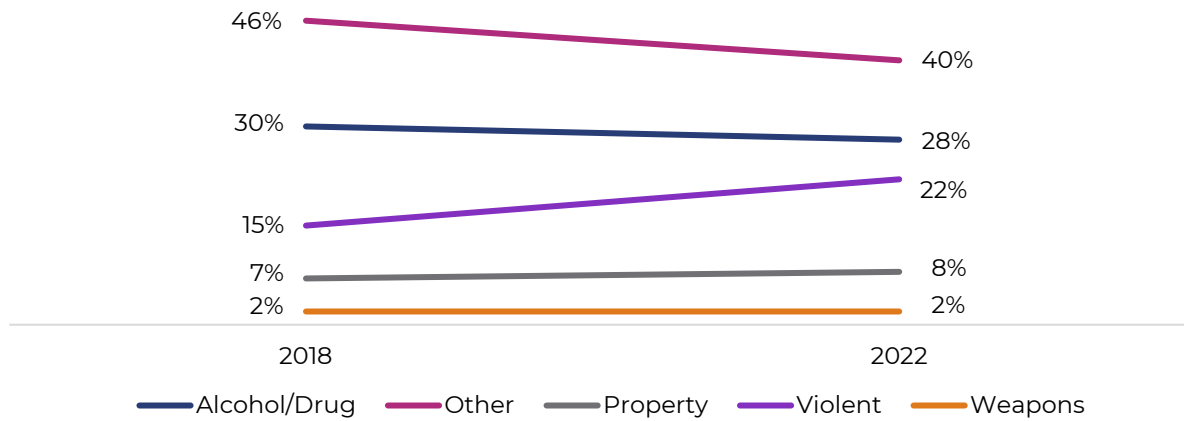
⁴ A status offense is one in which only a juvenile can be arrested for. As shown in Appendix Table 38, the only status offenses documented in 2021 and 2022 were curfew violations.

Arrests by offense type

What types of crimes were adults and juveniles arrested for in 2022?

As Figure 4A shows, the most common arrest type for adults was for “Other” offenses, but it represented a smaller percentage in 2022 (40%) compared to 2018 (46%). Over the same period, the proportion that represented arrests for a violent offense increased (from 15% to 22%). The proportion of arrests for an alcohol/drug-related offense, the second most common arrest type, decreased slightly from 2018 to 2022 (30% to 28%).

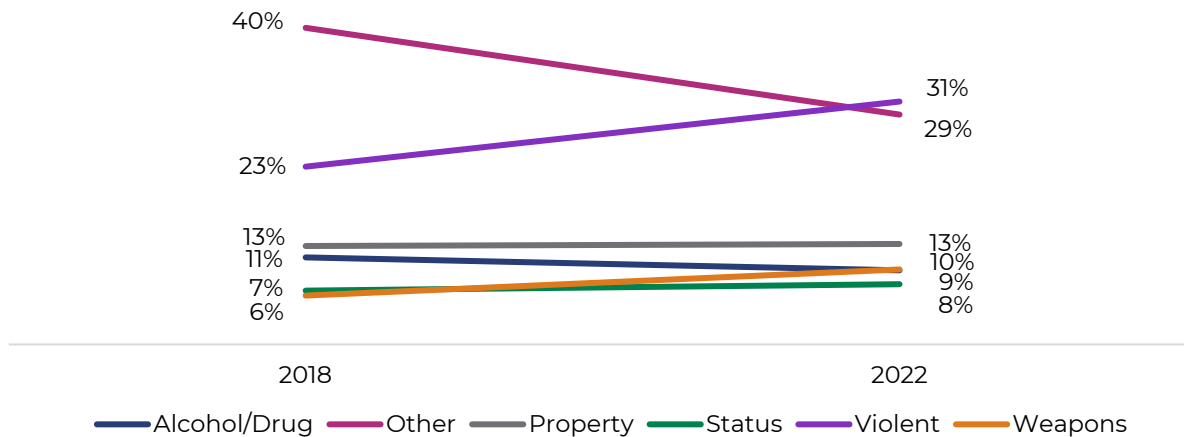

For juveniles (Figure 4B), the most common arrest type in 2022 was for violent offenses (31%), followed by “Other” (29%), property (13%), weapons (10%), alcohol/drug (9%), and status (8%). The proportion of juvenile arrests for violent, weapons and status offenses increased from 2018 to 2022; in 2018, violent offenses represented 23%, weapons 6% and status offenses 7%, of arrests. With the exception of property offenses which remained unchanged, all other types showed slight decreases over this period, with the largest decrease being for “Other” offenses (40% to 29%).

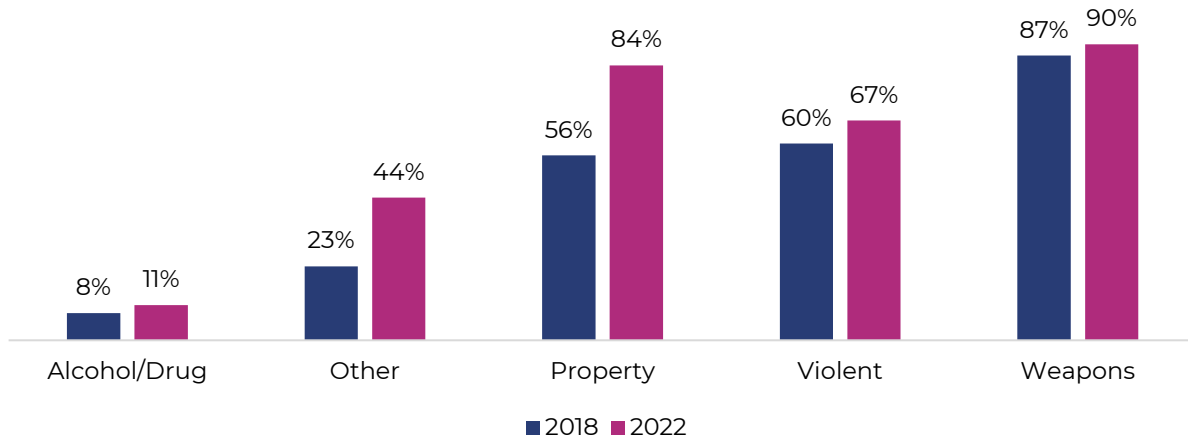

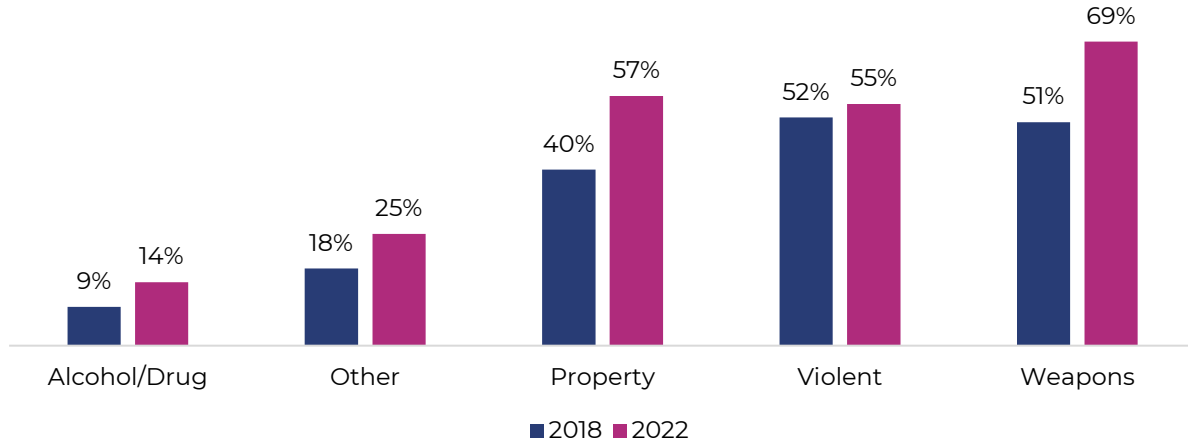
Around two in five arrests were at the felony-level in 2022. However, the proportion of arrests that were felonies versus misdemeanors varied considerably by crime type for both adults (Figure 5A) and juveniles (Figure 5B). Specifically, arrests for weapon offenses were most likely to be a felony, while those for “Other” and alcohol/drug offenses were more likely to be a misdemeanor.

Higher proportion of felony juvenile arrests for weapons



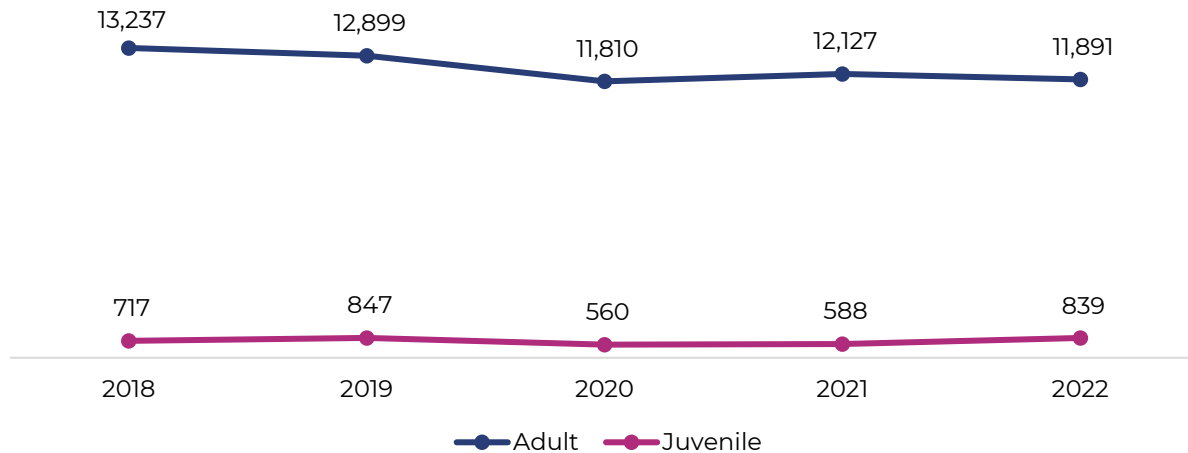

Violent offenses

The violent offense arrest category includes four felony-level offenses (homicide, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault) and one misdemeanor-level offense (manslaughter/assault and battery). There were 11,891 adult and 839 juvenile arrests for violent offenses in 2022 (Figure 6). Arrests for a violent offense decreased 2% over the past year for adults (Appendix Table 19). For juveniles, there was a 43% increase from 2021 to 2022, with the total being the second highest in the last five years (Appendix Table 32).

For adults, there was only an increase in robbery arrests (9%), all other categories decreased (homicide 22%, rape 26%, aggravated assault 3%, and manslaughter/assault and battery 2%) from 2021 to 2022 (Appendix Table 20). For juveniles, there were increases in the number of arrests for almost all categories, including robbery (127%), aggravated assault (12%), and misdemeanor manslaughter/assault and battery (43%). While numbers were too small to compare for homicide and rape, it is worth highlighting that arrests for homicide doubled from 5 in 2021 to 11 in 2022 (Appendix Table 33).

Arrests for violent offenses down for adults but up for juveniles



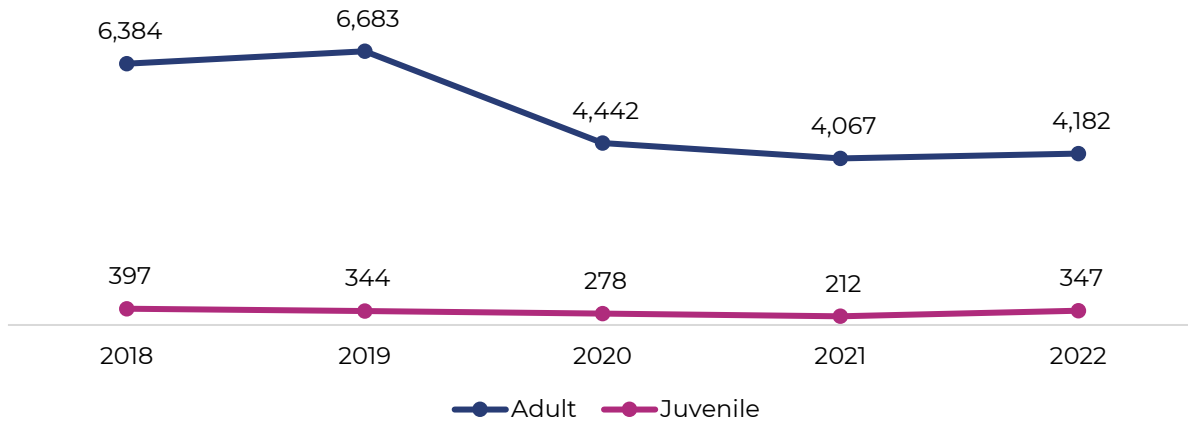

Property offenses

Property offenses include felony-level burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and misdemeanor-level petty theft/burglary. The number of adult arrests for a property crime increased by 3% from 2021 to 2022. This increase reversed a two-year downward trend (Figure 7 and Appendix Table 19). For juveniles, the number of arrests for a property crime increased by 64%, also reversing a downward trend of four consecutive years (Appendix Table 32).

For adults, there were decreases in arrests for petty theft/burglary (26%) and motor vehicle theft (16%) but increases in arrests for larceny thefts (45%) and burglary (6%) (Appendix Table 21). For juveniles, there were increases in arrests in all categories of property offenses (Appendix Table 34).

Arrests for property offenses up for both adults and juveniles



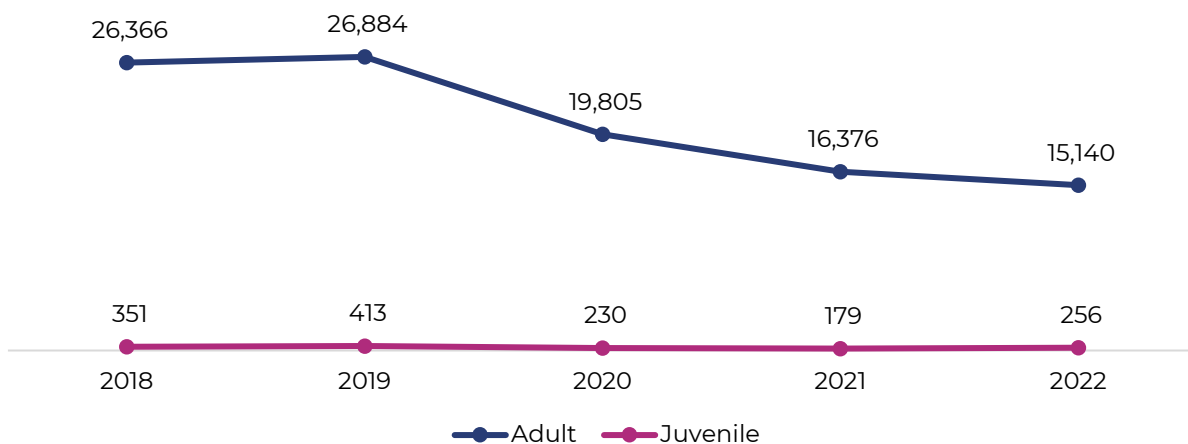

Alcohol/drug-related offenses

In 2022, there were 15,140 adult and 256 juvenile arrests for alcohol/drug-related offenses (Figure 8). For adults, this represented an 8% decrease from 2021, while for juveniles, it represented an increase of 43% (Appendix Tables 19 and 32).

Within the alcohol/drug-related offense category are five felony and five misdemeanor offenses. For adults, there were large enough numbers for comparison for eight of the categories, seven of which had a one-year decrease (ranging 3% to 74%) and one with a one-year increase (driving under the influence with 3%) (Appendix Table 22). For juveniles, there were increases in three misdemeanor-level categories: 6% for “Other,” 31% for drunk, and 107% for liquor laws offenses. The numbers across years for the rest were not large enough to compare (Appendix Table 35).

Alcohol/drug-related arrests up for juveniles, down for adults



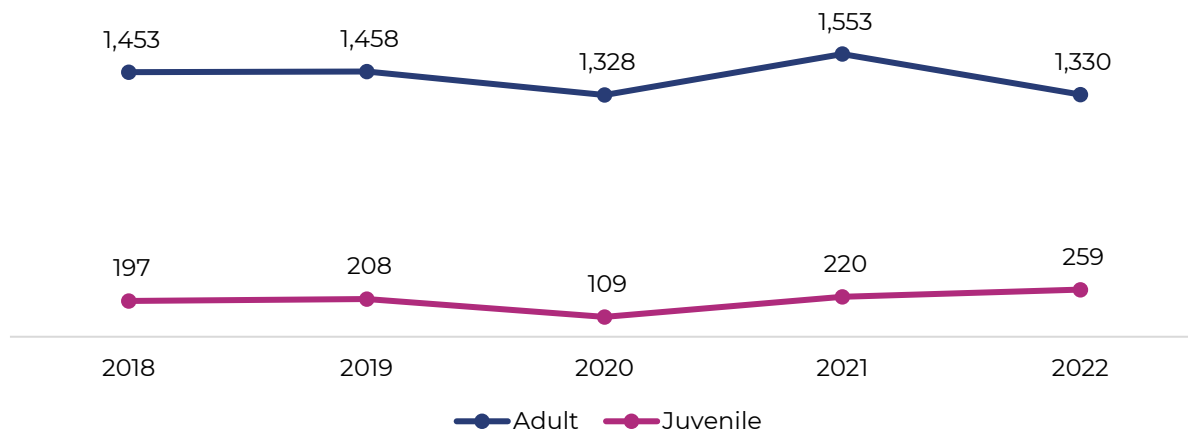

Weapons offenses

There were 1,330 adult and 259 juvenile arrests for weapons violations in 2022 (Figure 9), representing a 14% decrease for adults and an 18% increase for juveniles compared to the previous year (Appendix Tables 19 and 32).

For adults, arrests for both felony (-14%) and misdemeanor-level (-20%) weapons offenses were down (Appendix Table 23). For juveniles, there was a 42% increase in felonies, but a decrease of 15% for misdemeanors (Appendix Table 36).

Weapons related arrests up for juveniles, down for adults



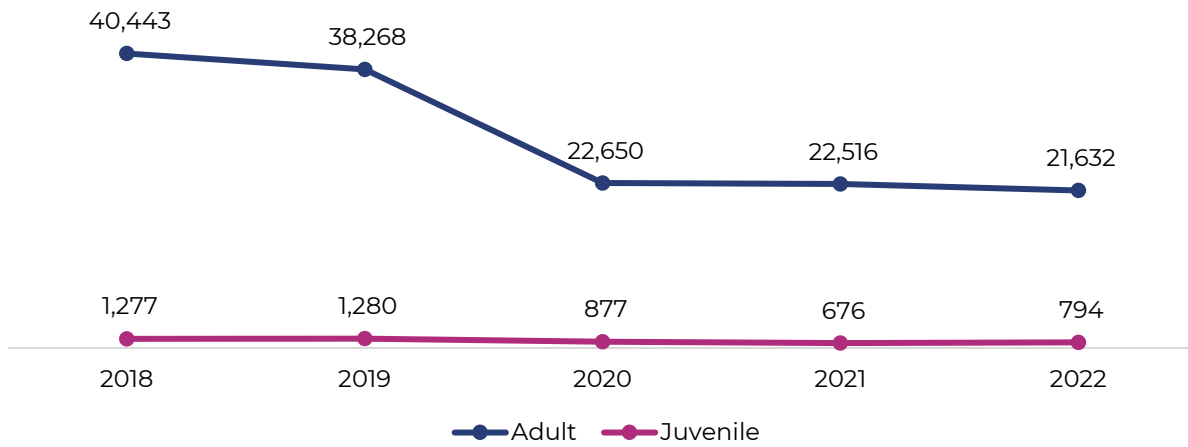

Other offenses

There were 21,632 adult and 794 juvenile arrests for “Other” offenses in 2022 (Figure 10). At the felony level, “Other” charges include sex-related offenses, forgery, and arson, as well as other felonies, such as kidnapping. At the misdemeanor level, “Other” offense types include other theft-related, sex-related and prostitution charges, disturbing the peace, vandalism/graffiti, hit-and-run-, selected traffic offenses, violations of city/county ordinances, failure to appear in court offenses, and other charges, such as contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Over the past year, there was a slight decrease in “Other” offense arrests for adults (4%), but an increase for juveniles (17%) (Appendix Tables 19 and 32).

For adults, there were increases in felony sex-related offenses (4%), forgery (12%), and arson (5%). At the misdemeanor level, there was only an increase in failure to appear/non-traffic (51%) and decreases in all other categories (ranging from 5% for sex related offenses to 52% for hit-and-runs) (Appendix Table 24). For the five categories that had numbers large enough to compare for juveniles, all had increases, ranging from 3% to 82%, except disturbing the peace (which includes trespassing and disorderly conduct) with a 3% decrease (Appendix Table 37).

Arrests for “Other” offenses up for juveniles, down for adults

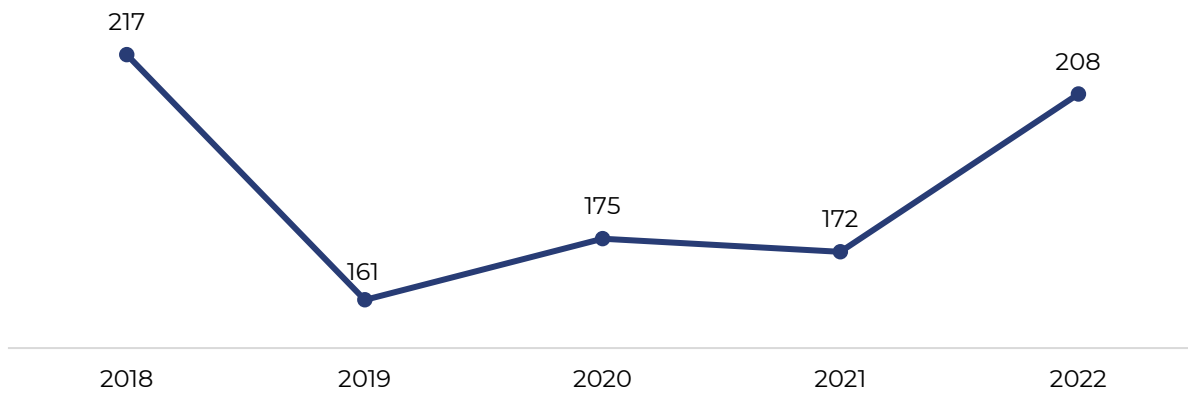

Status offenses

As Figure 11 shows, there were 208 status offense arrests in 2022, which represented a 21% increase from 2021. The only status offense documented in 2022 was curfew violations (Appendix Table 38).

Arrests across race/ethnicity and gender

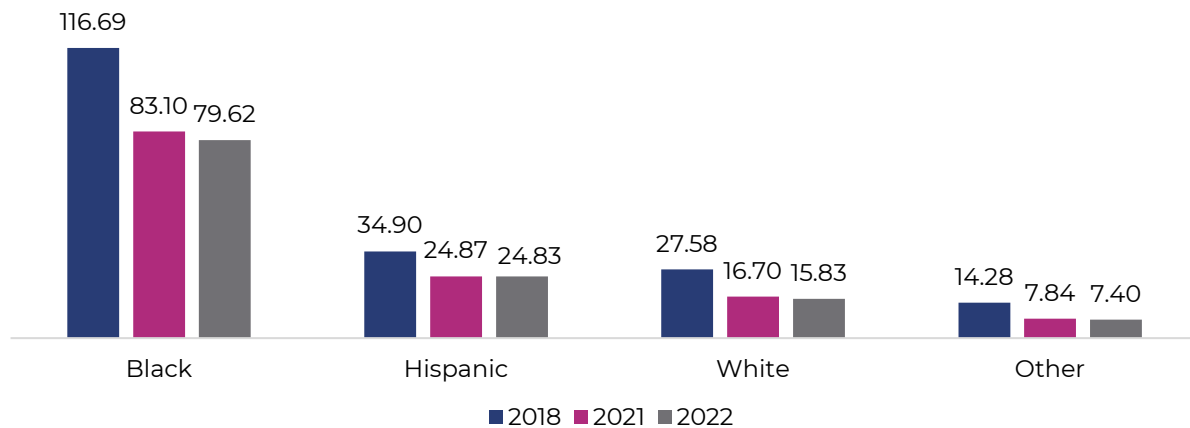
Race/Ethnicity

Historically, arrest rates have been calculated for this report by racial/ethnic groups⁵ (White, Black, Hispanic, and “Other”), as well as separately for adults and juveniles.⁶ As noted in previous reports, there is disproportionality when one compares these arrest rates, with Black individuals⁷ having the highest arrest rate and those who identify in “Other” groups having the lowest (Figure 12). Over the past year, arrest rates for all ethnicities decreased, ranging from 6% for “Other,” to under 1% for Hispanics (Appendix Table 2A).

Delving deeper into what types of crimes individuals of different races/ethnicities were arrested for, Figures 13A through 13D show for each of the four groups their proportion of the population, all arrests, and each of the six arrest types. As these figures show:

- Black individuals represented 4% of the adult population in the San Diego region in 2022 and 17% of all arrests. They were overrepresented in all arrest categories, ranging from 12% for alcohol/drugs to 26% for weapons.
- Hispanic individuals represented 31% of the population and 41% of all arrests in 2022. They were overrepresented in all categories.
- Individuals in the “Other” race/ethnicity category represented 19% of the population and 7% of all arrests. These individuals were underrepresented in each of the six arrest categories.
- White individuals represented 45% of the population and 35% of all arrests made in 2022. White individuals were underrepresented in each of the six arrest categories.

Arrests rates for black individuals higher than any other ethnicity



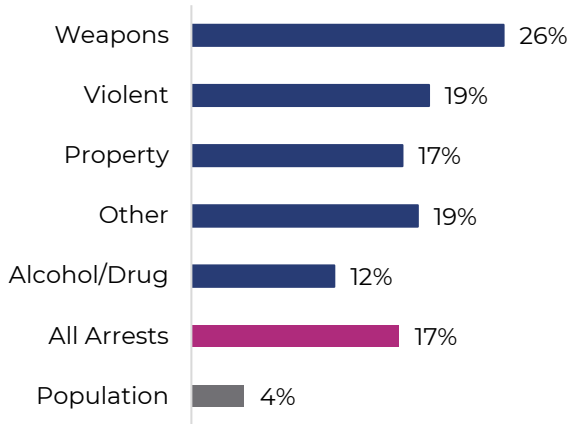

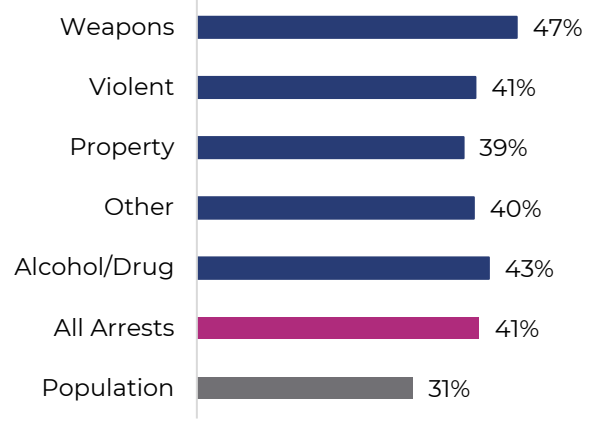

Black individuals overrepresented in all arrest categories



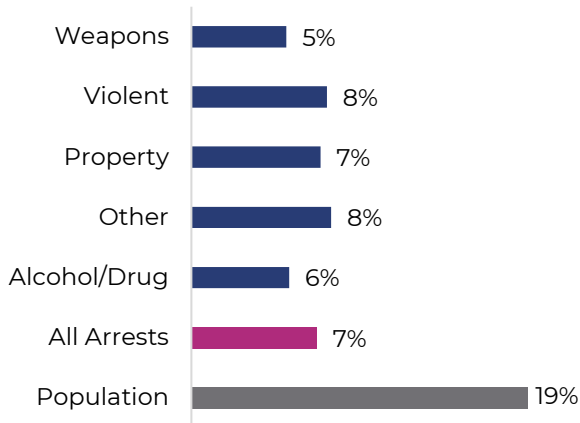

Hispanic individuals overrepresented in all arrest categories



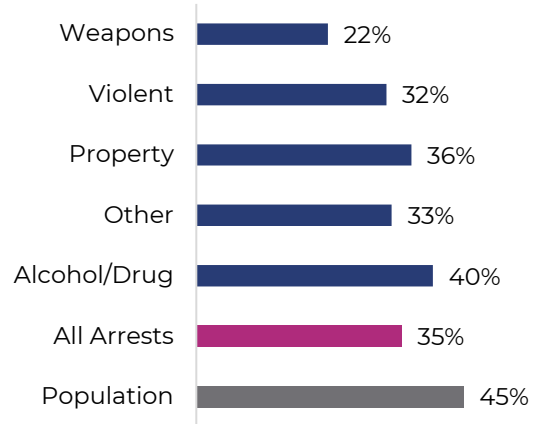

Around one in every 3 arrested individuals were White



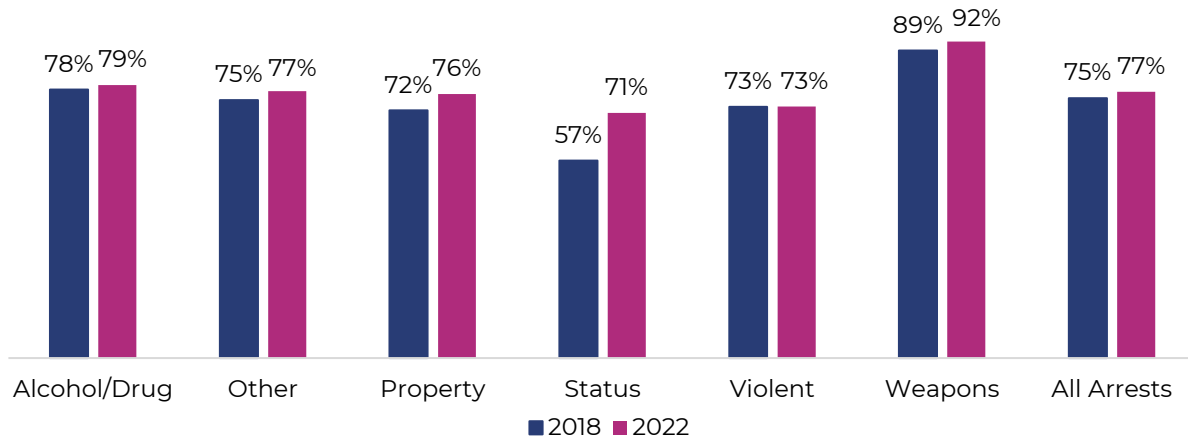

Gender and age

As Figure 14 shows, males represented 77% of overall arrests in 2022, a trend that is consistent compared to 2018. Across the arrest categories, males had the greatest proportion representation in weapon offenses (92%) and the smallest in status offenses (71%) relative to females.

Almost four in every five arrested individuals were males in 2022

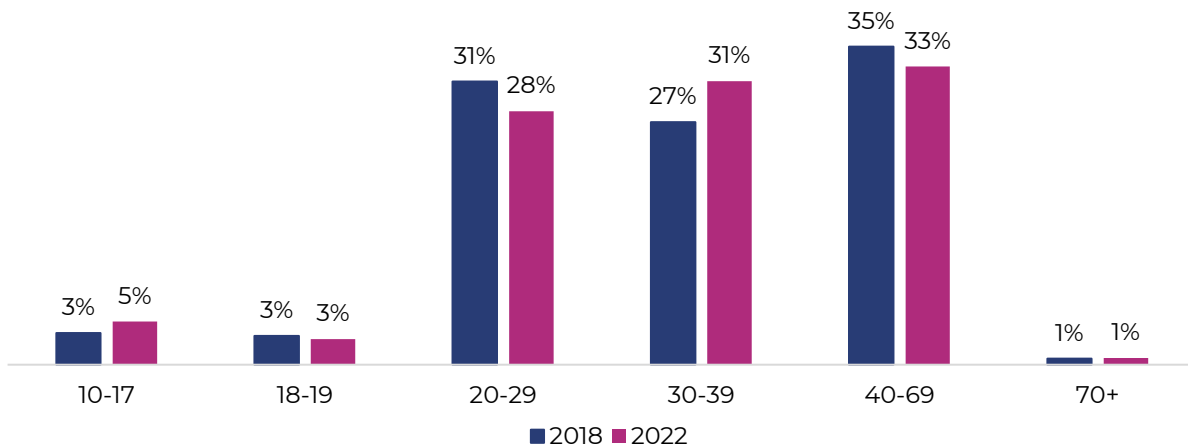

When examining arrests by age group as shown in Figure 15, arrestees aged 40 to 69 represented 33% of all arrests in 2022, compared to 35% in 2018.

Additional notes on the methodology

All data from 2016 to 2022 were analyzed from an ARJIS extract of all regional arrests and citations in October 2023.

In an attempt to replicate methodology used in prior reports, only arrests and citations that were indicated as “Reported to the State Monthly Arrest and Citations Register (MACR)” within the ARJIS database in the MACR status field were included in this report. Arrests/citations with a MACR status of “booked” and “other” were kept in the analysis, while those with a status of “cited” were removed to avoid duplication. Arrests with “infraction” as the highest charge level or one that could not be determined were also excluded from the analysis.

It is important to highlight that this report should not be compared to prior reports as data from previous years may have changed. Some changes from previous reports include the possibility of juvenile arrests from prior years being sealed once a youth reached the age of 18, or that there may be a larger proportion of arrests included in the “Other” category compared to previous years. Additionally, the data source for the statistics provided here (ARJIS) is different from the source for all CJ Arrest Bulletins prior to 2020 (DOJ). Moreover, as mentioned above, rates from 2021 presented in this report vary from the ones reported in previous years. For previous reports, the population estimates used were based on the 2010 Census. Population estimates used for this report are the first SANDAG estimates benchmarked to the 2020 Census, which incorporates improved methodologies and geographies.

It should also be noted that the numbers presented here represent a snapshot of arrests at one point in time when data were extracted, while the previous data set from the DOJ was a static reporting source. It is also important to acknowledge that the numbers in this report could vary from those published by other sources because there is the possibility one arrest was counted more than once if an arrest and citation record were created for the same event. Additionally, the ARJIS charge table is not synchronized with the California Master Charge Table and assumptions were required to replicate previously presented categories.

Summary

This CJ Bulletin describes the types of arrests made in the San Diego region in 2022 by local law enforcement. Local data submitted through ARJIS were analyzed for the past seven years with a revised methodology. Data showed that, overall, arrests decreased 3% in 2022, with arrest rates for adults at a seven-year low with a 5% decrease, while juvenile arrests increased for the first time in four years with 33% more than 2021. There were declines for all racial/ethnic groups, though Black and Hispanic individuals continued to be overrepresented in arrest statistics. Regarding type and level of offense, only arrests for property crimes increased (3%), and the proportion of felony level arrests decreased.
