More Violent Crimes Reported in First Half of 2022, Compared to Past Ten Years: Summary Statistics from the Mid-Year Crime Report

As part of a cooperative agreement with San Diego County local law enforcement, the SANDAG Criminal Justice Clearinghouse compiles crime statistics on a monthly basis, reporting on annual trends twice annually. With the recent release of the CJ Bulletin Crime in the San Diego Region Mid-Year 2022 Statistics, this CJ Flash highlights some of the key statistics reported in this full report.

Research findings from the Criminal Justice

Clearinghouse

Highlight 1

There were 6,182 violent crimes reported to local law enforcement between January and June 2022, a daily average of 34 (Figure 1), compared to 29 per day in 2015 (when there were 5,330, the eleven-year low). According to victimization surveys, only 40% of violent crime is reported to law enforcement.¹

Highlight 2

There are four types of violent crimes included in these statistics — homicide, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. As Table 1 shows, the number of homicides and robberies were up at mid-year 2022, compared to 2021, but the number of rapes and aggravated assaults were down. It is important to note though, that most violent crime are aggravated assaults, and while there were fewer reported at mid-year 2022, compared to mid-year 2021, the 2022 number was still the second highest in the past eleven years.

NOTE: In 2015, the definition of rape changed to include male victims and different forms of contact/penetration. As a result, some crimes that would previously have been coded as aggravated assaults were now rapes, as were some Part II crimes that were not included in these Part I statistics.

Highlight 3

Even though only about one in three property crimes are reported to law enforcement (according to the same survey cited in Highlight 1), most crime (81% at mid-year 2022) represents property crime (burglaries, larcenies, and motor vehicle theft). There were 26,448 property crimes reported between January and June 2022, an average of 146 per day (Figure 2). While the number of reported violent crimes represented an eleven-year high, this was the second lowest number reported since 2012.




Highlight 4

There were some interesting differences in how the number of reported property crimes has changed over time, as Figure 3 shows. Specifically, while residential burglaries were down in the first half of 2022 (compared to the first half of 2021), non-residential burglaries were up, the most common type of larceny (theft from a motor vehicle) was down, but the second most common type (theft from buildings) was up, and the second greatest number of motor vehicles was stolen in 2022, than any other year since 2012.
