

SANDAG and Caltrans District 11 are developing a Comprehensive Multimodal Corridor Plan (CMCP) for the Kumeyaay Corridor. The Kumeyaay Corridor CMCP aims to guide the development of innovative transportation network, transforming the way people and goods move through the central San Diego region. This CMCP evaluates all travel modes and transportation facilities in the study area using real-time travel data and incorporating public input. Completing the CMCPs will help the San Diego region compete for local, state, and federal funds, including Senate Bill (SB)1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. The Kumeyaay Corridor CMCP is anticipated to be completed in late 2023.

## June 29, 2022, Meeting Minutes

Chair Erica Pinto (Jamul) called the meeting of the Interagency Technical Working Group on Tribal Transportation Issues Special Tribal Broadband Workshop to order at 10:02 a.m.

#### 1. Welcoming Remarks

Chair Pinto welcomed Working Group members to the meeting. Chair Pinto announced resources available for improving internet connectivity. Vice Chair Antoinette Meier congratulated Chairwoman Pinto on her recent appointment to the Secretary's Advisory Committee and provided some additional opening remarks. Chair Pinto facilitated self-introductions by encouraging members to add their Tribal Affiliation in the chat and started the meeting with a blessing.

#### 2. Introductions

Krystal Ayala, Chris Schmidt, and Pricila Roldan facilitated introductions through an ice-breaker activity.

#### **REAP 2.0 Tribal Set-Aside**

#### Introduction

The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) established the Regional Early Action Planning 2.0 Grant (REAP 2.0) as part of the 2021 California Comeback Plan under AB 140.

The Notice of Funding Availability and Final Guidelines for Tribal and Rural Allocation of the Regional Early Action Planning Grant Program (REAP 2.0) was released in July 2022. Federally Recognized Tribes and California Heritage Commission Recognized Tribes are eligible to apply for funding to support transformative and

innovative projects that accomplish both housing and climate goals: reducing VMT, increasing housing supply and affordability, and advancing equity. \$7.5 million is being set aside to be awarded through a competitive process.

#### Discussion

REAP 2.0 Tribal Set-Aside and Application Overview

REAP 2.0 Objectives include 1) Accelerating Infill Development that Facilitates Housing Supply Choice, and Affordability 2) Affirmatively Further Fair Housing and 3) Reducing Vehicles Miles Traveled. HCD proposes a flexible definition of infill for tribal entities and offers technical assistance, office hours, and an over-the-counter approach for all REAP 2.0 applications. Both planning and infrastructure investments are eligible projects in accordance with the REAP 2.0 objectives.

Staff will provide an overview of the REAP 2.0 application process and the various considerations and implications of this is program for tribal nations. Staff has reviewed projects listed in the Intraregional Tribal Transportation Strategy (ITTS) and the individual tribal Long-Range Transportation Plans for potential eligible uses and project examples for the REAP 2.0 application.

Tribal TWG members are asked to provide input on this program specifically in designating interest, identifying potential projects that meet the REAP 2.0 objectives, and other helpful information if considering SANDAG's support in submitting a REAP 2.0 grant application.

#### **Next Steps**

SANDAG can provide technical assistance in the REAP 2.0 Tribal and Rural application to include grant writing services, administration services, and additional support. SANDAG

wants to gauge tribal interest in this program and offer support if needed. The REAP 2.0 Tribal and Rural application is due December 31, 2022. All program funds must be expended by December 31, 2025.

## Update on the Kumeyaay Corridor Comprehensive Multimodal Corridor Plan

#### Overview

On September 27, 2019, the Board of Directors allocated funding to complete Comprehensive Multimodal Corridor Plans (CMCP) for 11 corridors throughout the region. CMCPs aim to inform decision-makers by providing a framework for an integrated transportation system by working with community partners and incorporating local, state and federal policy considerations. Additionally, CMCPs enable regions to compete for state funding under the Senate Bill 1 (SB 1), the Road Repair and Accountability Act and the Congested Corridors Program.

#### Action: **Discussion**

An overview of the Kumeyaay Corridor Comprehensive Multimodal Corridor Plan and Mission Valley Mobility Study will be presented.

#### **Fiscal Impact:**

Completion of the Corridor Plan will allow SANDAG and Caltrans to compete for state funds.

#### Schedule/Scope Impact:

The Kumeyaay Corridor Comprehensive Multimodal Corridor Plan is scheduled to be completed in Fall 2023.

The Kumeyaay Corridor Study area (Attachment 1) runs along Interstate 8 and is located on traditional, ancestral, and unceded lands of the Kumeyaay people. The project study area has connections with Interstates 5, 805, 15 and State Routes 163, 125 and 67 in the cities of San Diego, Santee, La Mesa, Lemon Grove and El Cajon, as well as the County of San Diego. The Kumeyaay Corridor study area also includes the Metropolitan Transit System (MTS) Green and Orange Line Trolleys and multiple bus routes, local roadways, bike and pedestrian facilities.

#### **Key Considerations**

Caltrans and SANDAG are developing the Kumeyaay Corridor CMCP in collaboration with the Cities of San Diego, Santee, La Mesa, Lemon Grove, El Cajon, the County of San Diego, tribal nations, San Diego State University, Port of San Diego, San Diego Gas & Electric, San Diego Airport Authority, and MTS. Representatives from each organization make up the Agency Coordination Team.

Throughout its development, the CMCP will focus on transportation solutions that foster community livability, trip reliability and efficiency, greenhouse gas emissions reduction strategies, protecting natural resources, environmental resilience, and an equitable distribution of transportation improvements.

Research on the corridor's existing conditions has been completed and the project team, in collaboration with community partners, has initiated public outreach. A virtual public meeting was held on Thursday, September 15, 2022. In addition to ongoing direct outreach, the team is also gathering community input through a virtual engagement hub.

#### **Mission Valley Mobility Study**

SANDAG, Caltrans, MTS, and the City of San Diego also are developing the Mission Valley Mobility Study. This study is funded by the Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant Program and will identify and prioritize near-term mobility needs and focus on transportation services and access options that decrease congestion and improve travel times for all transportation modes in the area including SDSU Mission Valley and Riverwalk.

#### **Next Steps**

The project team will continue gathering feedback through the public engagement site survey which closes on October 14, 2022, and interactive map which closes on November 4, 2022. Utilizing existing conditions information, data analysis and public input, the team will begin developing transportation solutions for consideration in Spring 2023.

Caltrans and SANDAG staff will provide periodic updates on this project at future meetings.
